The evening talks programme for autumn 2025 and spring 2026 is now finalised and a free printed programme is available at the autumn meetings from September

2025. The talks will as usual be in Austwick village (large) hall and are normally held on the third Wednesday of each month from September 2025. (Please note the altered timing of the October 2025 which is on the third Wednesday of October and our December 2025 talk which is on the second Wednesday of December).

The topics of the forthcoming Wednesday evening talks during autumn 2025/spring 2026 are as follows: Craven Place Names, Edward Elgar's links to Giggleswick, Sustainable Farming in the Dales and the Clapham Wader Monitoring Project, Droving, Wild Ingleborough, RSPB Bird Investigations, Geology Giants, Common Land, The Work of the Craven Wildlife Rescue Centre, and Fossils and Fossil Hunters in the Yorkshire Dales.

The first autumn talk by **Mike Spence** on **Craven Place Names** was held on Wednesday 17<sup>th</sup> September 2025 from and attracted more than 50 members and guests. The talk examined the history of Craven and its towns and villages, by looking at the names assigned to them long ago by the people who lived in or controlled the area. Most names still in use today will be seen to have originated around a thousand years ago, and in some cases, several centuries earlier. The talk was very interesting and informative, and proved a fitting opening talk for this autumn's events.

#### **Nature Recovery Update**

The Society has undertaken several conservation schemes over the past few months in line with its revised constitution. See a separate article describing the sand martin nesting box. Our thanks to David Baker who built the box using a grant from the Yorkshire Dales Millenium Trust.



The restoration of the Feizor hay meadow is the biggest ongoing project and to date the existing stone wall has been repaired and re-fencing of the northern perimeter is also now complete. Strimming and clearance of brambles has recently started now the bird nesting season is over and will be followed by removal of bramble roots and sowing of wild flower seeds later in the autumn. Volunteer help will be needed for this exercise-if you are fit and keen to help, please contact Alex Pilkington (alexpilk@msn.com) if you are interested.
